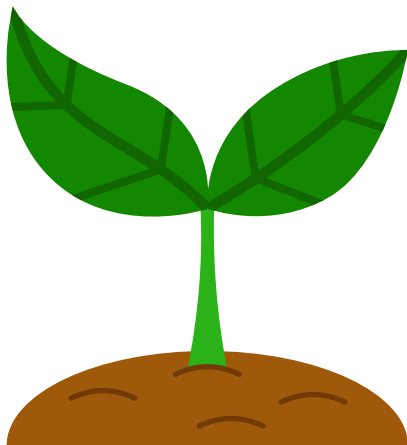


What are T Levels?

How to get into agriculture or horticulture



T Levels are nationally recognised qualifications for **16 to 19-year-olds** and they are a great way to become **qualified** while getting **on-the-job experience**.

Sometimes called **technical education**, T Levels are a great way to continue your studies **after your GCSEs**. They suit students who wish to combine **classroom learning** with **industry experience**.

Lasting **two years**, T Levels are **level 3 qualifications**, offered as an **alternative to A Levels, other post-16 courses or an apprenticeship**.

They have been **designed with leading employers** to give you the knowledge and skills you need to **forge your own career**.

To **enrol** you need to be **16 to 19 years old and live in England**.

T Levels can prepare you for a career in farming or growing

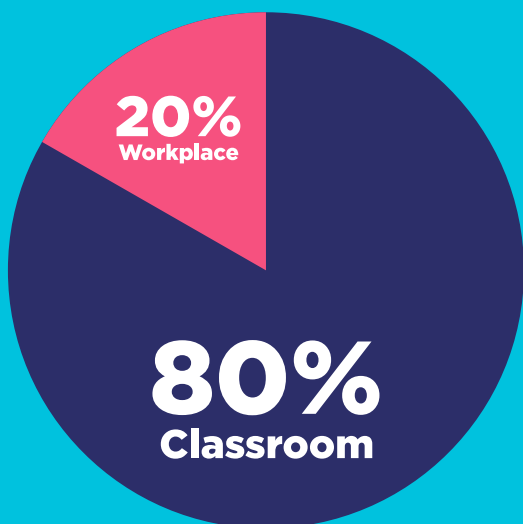


A T Level in **Agriculture, Land Management and Production** offers students the core knowledge and skills needed for a range of jobs in agriculture, land management and production.

Like all T Levels, this course is **designed by leading businesses and employers**. It helps you **learn technical knowledge** in the **classroom** and apply it to the working world through **tasks and projects**.

As part of the course you will spend around **45 days on a placement in a workplace environment**. The rest of your learning will be at your chosen further education provider, such as college or sixth form.

The practice you gain in your placement is **sought after and attractive to potential employers**, who value the skills, depth of knowledge and experience you develop.



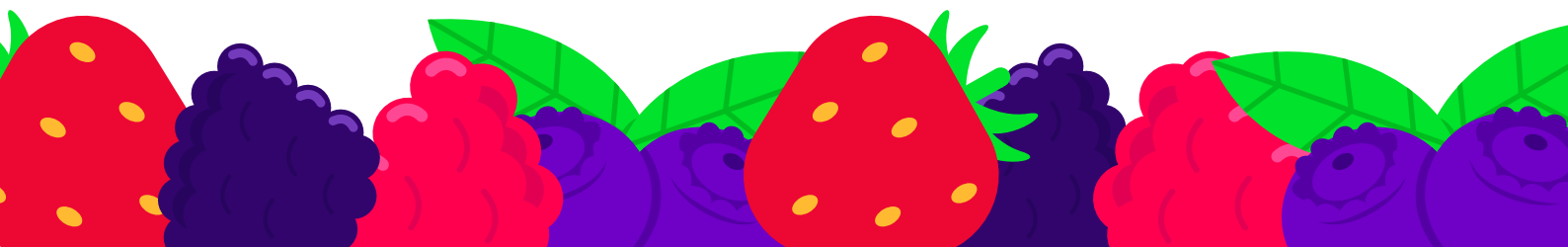
T Level Foundation year

It will enable you to develop your **English** and **maths**, practical, technical and study skills, and provide **work experience** to help you **excel** in your T Level.

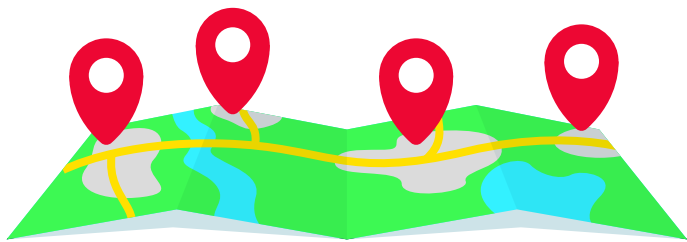

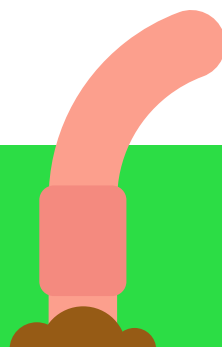
